Below is a list of key look-fors that can be seen in PLi teacher classrooms.

Blended Learning Models

Teachers use <u>Blended Learning Models</u> that help to blend digital and traditional learning environments, and increase student ownership and efficacy.

- Station-Rotation Model
- Flex or Flexible Playlist Model
- Flipped Classroom Model

Flexible Content and Tools

Teachers use instructional materials (digital and analog) that allow for differentiated experiences and pacing.

- GVC (digital and analog)
- Creativity tools within Microsoft 365 and other applications (Class Teams, Nearpod, Flip, etc.)
- Interactive touch display technology (Promethean Panel)

Mix of Learning Settings

Teachers use a mix of Teacher-Led and Student-Led learning settings within a lesson, including:

- Whole Group Instruction
- Targeted Small Group Instruction
- Independent Tasks
- Collaborative Tasks
- Student Goal-Setting and Reflection

Data Driven Decisions

Teachers frequently use both digital and analog tools to collect a variety of data that informs instruction and groupings in the moment. These data points lead to targeted small group support within a lesson.
